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Our point of departure

- The Arctic is currently experiencing a period of rapid and transformative change what scientists often call a "state change"
 - 1. The Arctic leads the world in terms of the scope and pace of climate change.
 - 2. Coupled with globalization, this has fueled a "gold rush" mentality among those interested in oil and gas development, shipping, fishing, tourism, and so forth.

What makes such periods particularly challenging?

- 1. Thresholds, tipping points, and non-linear changes are to be expected
- 2. Abrupt changes are entirely possible
- 3. Emergent properties are complex
- 4. Regional-global linkages become tighter

What is the role of governance?

- It's easy to get carried away with the implications of these developments
 - Visions of an "Arctic meltdown" are highly exaggerated
 - The Arctic is not the "Wild West" with regard to governance, as Hans Corell has observed
- Still, it's prudent to think hard about how to steer or manage Arctic processes to promote good things and avoid bad things during times of rapid change
 - Our goal is stewardship: sustainability with justice
 - Conditions of transformative change create windows of opportunity as well as challenges

The Arctic is not a blank slate

- Governance systems in the Arctic are already well-developed
 - There is no need to reinvent existing arrangements that work well
- The Arctic is also a governance compass
 - There are important success stories
 - The Arctic is a source of innovative initiatives of broader significance
 - There are additional opportunities for innovation
