The Barents Regional Youth Council

Our mission

We will strengthen the youth cooperation in the Barents region and empower young people to actively participate in the shaping of the Barents region and the society in which we live.

Introduction

At its meeting on 5 September 2001, the Barents Regional Council decided to draw up a youth programme for the Barents Region. This was done at the direct request of the Barents Regional Youth Forum, BRYF, which was represented at the meeting and called for concrete action. The present programme is based on the conclusions from the Conference "Face the Future", which was held on 12-16 May 2001 in Tromsø, Norway. BRYF ended its work in 2003.

In 2003 The Norwegian ministry for children and family affairs allocated 1 mill NOK per year for two years to support multilateral youth projects in the region. The Norwegian Barents secretariat got the responsibility of managing the fund. A youth coordinator was employed and the extra recourses made a broader implementation of the program possible. The funding has continued until today and a new programme is developed.

Background

The countries in the Barents region have many common challenges when it comes to youth issues and this invites to increased cooperation about these matters.

During an international youth seminar in Murmansk October 2003, the participants strongly signalised that young people want to participate more actively in the Barents cooperation. They concluded that the best way to ensure this would be to establish a new youth structure in the Barents cooperation, a council consisting of young people from the whole region.

Establishment

The establishment meeting for the Barents regional Youth Council (BRYC) was held in Kirkenes during the festival Barents Spektakel 2004.

The council consists of one youth representative from each county, oblast, republic and okrug in the region and one representative for indigenous youths. The 14 members of the council will work towards a strengthening of the youth cooperation in the Barents region.

The members are chosen by their county administration based on the following criteria: - He or she must have an age fitting the category "Youth" (over 18 and under 30 years) and speak English, have knowledge about youth issues in their region and be interested in international cooperation

Organisation

BRYCs secretariat is in the hands of the person responsible for the youth program at the Barents secretariat in Kirkenes. The Secretariat invites the members to the meetings, find suitable meeting dates and arrange travel and accommodation for the participants. The Barents Youth Cooperation Office (BYCO) in Murmansk have the responsibility to coordinate the participation of the representatives on the Russian side and make plans for travels, arrange visas and spread information BRYCs closest collaborator in the Barents cooperation is the Regional Working group on Youth Issues.

ACTIVITIES

Council meetings

The Barents Regional Youth Council with all representatives meets normally twice a year. In 2010 the meetings were held in Luleå, Sweden and Kirkenes, Norway

One of the biggest challenges in the Northern areas and the one on top of the political agenda both on the regional and central level in Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia is that many youngsters leave the region to live in the South and that there are very few young people from the other parts of the country who wish to live in the Northern areas. That is why the region should be made attractive for the young people through the knowledge about the quality of life and real opportunities in the north.

The Barents Regional Youth Council therefore arranged a workshop "Barents Passion Week" 27.-31. October in Kirkenes, Norway. The aim of the project was to emphasize the good life in the High North. The project contributed to increase of the desire to live in and the knowledge about the quality of life in Barents. The project gave young inhabitants of the Barents region understanding of the significance of correct and positive information and communication about the life in the north and the importance about being proud of the societies we live in. It is important to let the Barents youth realize all the advantages of the life in the North as well as to get rid of all the wrong images and stereotypes that exist among the rest of the population.

This was done by gathering together 80 youths aged 18-29 from the whole Barents region (20 from each of the countries Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia divided among 13 member regions of the Barents region) with different cultural and ethnical background fro 3 days in Kirkenes. There was arranged several parallel creative workshops that ended up in a joint Barents menu. The menu consisted of different small cultural events, performances or experiences that was be presented for the people in Kirkenes at Barents Passion Café. The project was innovative and exiting and involved the participants in important social and political questions in a new way through creative joint work.

Barents Regional Youth Council is working under the motto"Diversity is the Barents Identity" and they ensured that minimum 20% of the participants were of indigenous origin or ethnical minorities to reflect the fantastic diversity of the population in the North.

BRYC spin-offs 2010

The Reggae Rock and Rights Tour

The Reggae Rock and Rights Tour is a cultural tour about human rights for youth in the northern parts of Norway, Sweden, Finland and northwest Russia – the area we call Barents. The tour aim to raise awareness about human rights and to activate youth to work locally or internationally with the areas that interest them. The tour will through its unique concept give a taste of the richness of cultures in each region.

The Reggae Rock and Rights Tour will bring you:

School workshops aiming to raise the awareness about human rights. Are they current for us, youth aged 16-19 living in the Barents region? How do we want to use them? And is there something missing?

The greatest live music show providing a glimpse of the whole Barents region, including each country (Norway, Sweden, Finland, Russia) and their indigenous peoples (veps, nenets, sami).

A human rights festival, free and open for everyone. Good music will be playing, there will be stands with information from NGO's on how to get organised, good fun and a lot of people.

Barents Builders

This project wants to contribute to the creation of an active Area of Cooperation in Barents and The North Calotte and contribute to social integration, development of knowledge and transfer of knowledge. It is therefore important that the project includes all four countries: Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia. The ingredients that make this work are tolerance, democracy, diversity, participation and social entrepreneurship, which all together is a part of the ethos in Barents Builder.

Through the Barents Builder project the Barents region can become a pioneer when it comes to active citizenship and making the most of young peoples' initiatives, and thereby create a good basis for regional and local development.

The purpose with the project

In the project a model will be developed to stimulate border crossing youth projects, to increase the number of contacts and cooperations/projects across borders.

As a part of the Barents Builder model, an education and training will be developed, with the purpose of increasing the knowledge of young people of the possibilities and the competence of how to make their own project ideas a reality.

- In the Barents Builder project 28 young people will be educated in regional crossborder project work, the education to be quality assured and acknowledged through the OCN-method.
- Approx. 28 projects with regional cross-border activities will be realised as a result.
- The project's participants will also be trained to be resource persons for other young people with regards to regional cross-border projects.
- Around 150 young people in the entire Barents and North Calotte region will obtain knowledge about the region's possibilities and how one can find ways to make them a reality.
- Common activity/project for building regional cross-border awareness about the region's possibilities.

There is a need for young creative entrepreneurs to participate in a positive development of the Barents Region. It is important that young people from the different countries in the region experience the value of learning about each other and exchange and acquire knowledge together.

Due to difficulties with support to the implementation of the project there was implement a pilot in 2010. There were three separate workshops during Barents Builders- pilot.

Niejda - Chicks in Sápmi

Niejda - Chicks in Sápmi is a mentoring program for Sami girls in Sweden. The project is soon to be launched and the project is looking for women aged over 20 that can become mentors.

The project is organized by the Barents Regional Youth Council, and the Sami Youth Parliament Sáminuorra. This autumn the project Niejda-up Sápmi Chicks will start. Now the project leaders need mentors to the project.

As a mentor you'll become a role model for girls and a human being who listens, encourages and plays an important role in young girls' lives. You get an education in Stockholm at " Fryshuset ", tutoring, and participation in a number of inspiration-evenets in different subjects with other mentors during the year.

Barents Stories- The photo book about Barents

Photo is about seeing (and photographing) the world from new perspectives. The project emphasizes the view of the Barents region as a dynamic that takes advantage of young people's driving force, which acts as a catalyst for increased cooperation locally and internationally.

In order to change the Barents, we must first transform the image in and out of our region, from static to dynamic.

By early increase young people's image of their surroundings in the north from a national game plan to a regional Barents Identity creates future opportunities for increased business cooperation and trade between the countries of the region but also provide a living community.

Pininga Youth Camp

A international project is soon being implemented in Arkhangelsk. Within the project there will be rafting along the Pinega River in the Arkhangelsk region with visits to historical places and local villages located along the river.

Today tourism has become part and parcel of peoples' lives. And it is becoming more and more popular all over the world. It's amazing that the number of people is growing, who choose not huge cosmopolitans and cities as their destination, but go to rural areas to camp, hike and enjoy untouched nature. What's more lots of young people are combining rural tourism with different sport activities like skiing in winter, hiking, camping or rafting.

That is why two young Barents enthusiasts decided to make an event, which will be enjoyable for the young people all over the Barents Region. Floating along the river, camping, visiting the places with deep history and experiencing Russian rich culture.

The main topic of the project is tourisms. Participants will not only camp and raft, but also have some training on teambuilding and seminars and lectures on tourism and business. We want to make the event annual, attracting people from the Barents region.

Information and other activities

The representatives of BRYC have informed local and regional NGOs in their Counties about larger Barents Youth events. The information flow has a great potential for improvement and all members are now building up their own list of addresses in their mailbox to be able to forward messages and links.

MAJOR CHALLENGES AND FUTURE PLANS

Turnover

The turnover among the members in BRYC is high due to the migration of youths out of the region. This creates a situation that makes it necessary for the counties to look for potential future members constantly. The different youth structures in the counties also make difficulties for recruitment of members. Some members are appointed while others are elected.

Information

More effort must be done to ensure the information flow to regional NGOs, politicians and media to show the activities within the youths sphere in Barents. The website www.barentsyouth.org has been developed in 2006 and have been translated into Russian language since 2007.

Training

To increase the member's skills for international cooperation and coordination of activities, BRYC is arranging project management and leader training seminars. They also take part in courses arranged by others.

There was arranged one training course in 2010 and the summary is enclosed. The main aim was to find good work methods for BRYC and make sure that the meetings and cooperation is fruitful and efficient.

Special focus in 2011

BRYC will in 2011 focus on active citizenship and concentrate on getting closer cooperation with the other youth structures in the Barents region.

Youth participation

The UNs Convention on the Rights of the Child states that children and youths have the right to be heard in all matters that concerns them. This demands that the adults take the responsibility to crate the structures and arenas where this takes place.

The Convention acknowledges that children and youth have the right to express their opinions and to have those opinions heard and acted upon and that they have the right to take part in decisions. It is of major importance that we show that we take this seriously and that we show and act according to our attitudes weather it comes to rights of the child, human rights or equality of genders in the Barents cooperation.

Youth are a priority group in the Barents cooperation and it is about time that BRYC is invited to all the arenas where decisions are made- The Regional committee and the Barents regional council. Furthermore it is important that the youths have a vote there to make sure they have real influence and don't participate only as observers.

Time: 13 – 18

Venue: Kulturens hus, Luleå

Participants: BRYC and Maria Östensson, Lars Miguel Utsi from RWGYI

1. Energizers and creativity boost

We started off with some energizers, The Perfect Triangle and Hunter/protector and then did an exercise called Only suggestions or YES! to boost each others positive feedback on creativity. We also did an impro-exercise in pairs. Good fun! When we were all warmed up and comfy with each other we continued with a Creativity Workshop. During the workshop we came up with some guidelines for a creative sessions:

Guidelines

- -Never say no
- -Be open
- -Easy to be creative in small groups
- -Be supportive, don't make anyone feel silly
- -Give and take space. If you feel that you are a person that have a lot of creativity and a lot of energy, and if you feel that someone in the group isn't at that level try to lift that person and help that person to come to that level.

2. Me and the world

The next exercise was Me and the world, where we used 15 minutes to write down what we are good at, what gives us inspiration and things we want to happen. Then we sat down in pairs with someone that we felt we hadn't talked to much enough, and told them about our thoughts.

Then we did the same thing in the big group, but for BRYC. We listed what BRYC was good at, what inspires us (who are BRYC) and what we want to happen.

For us to work for BRYC, BRYC need to do something for us. It is important to include something that everybody wants in their life in BRYCs work. Jens said: "Do this often as individuals and in groups. It's a good way to find out
what resources there are in the group. It is important as we often are good at blocking ourselves out – and see other peoples skills."
3. Make up our own meeting rules There are different categories in a meeting. Divide the agenda in certain areas/categories: Creative Discussion Info Decision Debate Each category has its own set of guidelines to make the meetings more effective. Try to make it superefficient as we have such a long agenda, and we will be so if we tag each topic on the agenda to a category. It is also good to send out this set
of guidelines with the meeting agendas, and to go through it in the beginning of each meeting so that everyone are up to date with the rules BRYC have agreed on.

Guidelines for a discussion:

The point with the discussion: to reach a decision. Hear the different arguments. Open for change. A discussion is a tool to help me formulate an opinion. If I enter the discussion with a firm belief then it is an argumentation or debate.

After the discussion is over you can reach a decision. If you decide before then maybe the discussion isn't needed at all.

If it is a difficult task to discuss then try to keep it alive in between the meetings, through email or skype or facebook.

Make sure everyone get the same amount of time – that means that the ones who talk a lot must leave time and space for others. It also means that everyone needs to take his or her responsibility to talk. For example through an open circle.

Tagline: separate the topic from the person. Maintain an equal structure (make everyone feel included in the structure).

One at a time

Respect the others

Stick to the topic

Establishing how the meeting should be before the meeting, like passing out the guidelines before

Guidelines for information:

Tagline: short and precise, consequences of the information, what it means.

Short description.

Pay attention

Topic oriented

Relevant

Important that everyone get the same information so nobody know less or more than the others

Guidelines for decisions:

Tagline: It's ok to disagree. That everybody's on board (understands).

Bee hives/cluster – divide yourselves in small small groups and discuss before making the decisions

Anonymous voting

A common ritual

If the other things have been set then the decision making shouldn't take long time

Distribute responsibility. Schedule, date for follow-up or half time check.

Make sure that everybody has been heard

Suggestion on a common thing to say: It's BRYCed.

Guidelines for a debate:

Hard to reach a common goal, often gets emotional. Reach a common, vote or something. But after that try to repair the split actively. Acknowledge the split and see how to connect to each other.

4. Resources

We started to go through BRYC's resources in Money, Time, Inventory and Networks/Human Resources.

BRYC have a lot of things to do. Maybe we can engage every representative's network – who we are cooperating with in each region and each person. We want to allocate time and money to the things BRYC wish to work with.

Rights now: the BRYC event 2010. We tried to estimate how much time we needed for the preparations of Barents Passion Week in Kirkenes.

Barents Passion Week in Kirkenes

Time spent: 30 days Laila, 5 days BRYC

Network: Local youth club "Basen" – Halvard/Laila

Jens: "Try to do this exercise when you meet and keep track of your resources and your goal. It's a good way of making it really concrete."

5. Ending and followup

We ended the day with some singing and dancing and agreed that we have only just started this work and to let all of this sink down and talk about it the next time BRYC meet.
